

"Because we only trust the experts..."

This contract is entered into between the parties signed below – (1) the patient and (2) the doctor/medical practitioner who is to administer the Covid-19 vaccine. Under this agreement, the doctor/medical practitioner who wish to administer this vaccine **must provide information about all material risks** to which a reasonable person in the patient's position would attach significance. If the doctor/medical practitioner **fails to properly discuss** the risks and alternative treatments with the patient, he is rendered to be **personally liable for damages**.

By signing below, the doctor/medical practitioner assumes personal liability for damages and in exchange, the patient is willing to be vaccinated with the recommended vaccine and sign the waiver which absolves the government and manufacturer from any liabilities.

## **GUIDELINES**

The Doctor/Medical Practitioner MUST address the following:

- 1. Recognize risks of harm that you believe anyone in the patient's position would want to know. You'll know these already from your professional knowledge and experience.
- 2. The effect of the patient's individual clinical circumstances on the probability of a benefit or harm occurring. If you know the patient's medical history, you'll know some of what you need to share already, but the dialogue could reveal more.
- 3. Risks of harm and potential benefits that the patient would consider significant for any reason. These will be revealed during your discussion with the patient about what matters to them.
- 4. Any risk of serious harm, however unlikely it is to occur.
- 5. Expected harms, including common side effects and what to do if they occur.

Remarks:

Patient's right to his life is protected under the 1987 Philippine Constitution under Art II. Sec. 11 and Art III. Sec. 1

Any law, ordinance, executive order which contradicts this Constitutional protection and guaranty is invalid and has no force and effect.

Any form of coercion, even in the guise of an order/law that turns out to be unconstitutional, is criminal under Art. 286 of the Revised Penal Code.
